What is the problem (C2)?

With an increasingly mobile population, people are traveling all over the world. Depending on their destination, they will need different types of immunizations, vaccinations, prophylaxis, etc. Gastrointestinal, febrile, and dermatologic diseases are the most common types of travel-related illness, and many of these are preventable with appropriate pre-travel preparation. Measles remains a common disease in many parts of the world. Each year around the world, an estimated 10 million people get measles, and about 110,000 of them die from it. Anyone not protected against measles is at risk of getting infected when they travel internationally. Pre-travel advice from a healthcare professional regarding vaccinations and education regarding food and water-borne illness is recommended. Physicians should be adequately preparing patients pre-/post-travel by appropriately treating for any preexisting medical conditions, administering proper immunizations, prescribing preventive medications and counseling patients on the medical and safety risks of their specific destination(s).
